The Art of Seeing is a three-day intensive study and application of the techniques I have developed to increase the photographic skills of the participants. Participants will notice a dramatic transformation in the way they understand the visual arts and photography. —William Shepley

### INFORMATION FOR STUDENTS

The principles I teach can be applied through almost any camera, so no special or professional equipment is required. Even a smart phone camera is acceptable. — William Shepley

#### **RECOMMENDED EQUIPMENT:**

- A camera with a 1.8 to 2.8 f-stop lens with a 50 to 120 mm focal length.
- Thumb drive
- Camera bag

#### **RECOMMENDED CLOTHING SUITABLE FOR ANY WEATHER CONDITIONS:**

- · All-terrain footwear
- Rain jacket, windbreaker, and/or warm coat

#### COVID-19

The workshop will be conducted with social distancing in mind, and students will be expected to drive themselves to the Hoodoo Ranch, approximately 13 miles south of Cody, off the Meeteetse highway. Wearing masks is optional but recommended.

#### **DIRECTIONS TO THE HOODOO RANCH**

From Sheridan Avenue, proceed out of town east on the Greybull highway (US 14 E/ US 16 E/ US 20 E).

Turn right onto WY-120 E, the Meeteetse highway; proceed for 7.8 miles.

Turn right onto Rd 3Cq; proceed for 1.6 miles.

Continue another 1.8 miles on the Hoodoo Ranch Road. The ranch buildings are on the left.
